Understanding the Issue of Livelihood


Poverty is having an insufficient livelihood to afford the things needed to survive.




The Official Poverty Measure (OPM) determines the income level officially considered to be "poverty."

When people's income before taxes falls below the poverty threshold, they may qualify for both government assistance and privately funded assistance.

The Supplemental Poverty Measure (SPM) is calculated differently, and as of 2022 was not used to determine people's eligibility for assistance.





In 2017, forty percent of Americans couldn't cover an emergency expense of \$400.

Labor Unions versus Right to Work Movement

Labor Unions: There are organized associations of workers for the purpose of collective negotiation. Workers pay dues to the organization.

Right to Work Movement: People in this movement are against mandatory membership in unions.

Two notable government initiatives to combat poverty during the 20th century:

- 1. 1930s: FDR's "New Deal" included minimum wage legislation
- 2. 1960s: Johnson's War on Poverty

Johnson's War on Poverty programs continue today:

- AmeriCorps VISTA
- Federal TRIO Programs
- Head Start for School Readiness
- Job Corps
- Medicaid
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)


FDR's minimum wage legislation continue today.


Established in 1938 as part of the Federal Labor Standards Act (FLSA).

Minimum Wage Legislation

The federal minimum wage requires an act of Congress and the president's signature to be changed. States, counties, and municipalities can and often do set their own minimum wage rates.

Money Illusion: Think about what a dollar can buy (the real value), not just the face value (the nominal value) of the dollar. When prices go up, I can buy less and less with each dollar and my purchasing power falls.
